Fourth Learning/Training/Teaching Activity hosted by, ITH Gembloux (Belgium)

VIDEOCONFERENCES 3 - 6 - 12 OF MAY 2021

Due to Covid 19, the 4th and final student meeting that should have taken place in May 2020 in Gembloux with all the partner schools was first postponed to May 2021 and had finally to be adapted.

This mobility, which concludes the two years of the SENHIAS project on invasive species, was therefore transformed into virtual mobilities with three mornings of videoconferences.

28th of April - Preparing visit : Cultural heritage "Bois du Cazier"

In preparation of this mobility, the classes in environmental education of ITH Gembloux visited the site of "The Bois du Cazier", classified as a world heritage by UNESCO.

The aim of this day was that the Belgian team could prepare the topic on cultural heritage to be presented at the students video conference meeting.

The morning began with a nature path on the slag heaps to discover the flora of this specific environment.

The afternoon was dedicated to the coal mine; this visit allowed the students to discover the working day of a miner and also to understand the scope of the biggest mining disaster that ever happened in Belgium on this site the 8th of August 1956 and that caused 262 victims.

Monday 3rd of May - Videoconference on the invasive species questionnaire.

This first meeting allowed the students to introduce themselves, to work together in small groups and to share their answers to the preparatory questionnaire on urban invasive species and finally to do a summary.

At the end of the morning, each group presented their feedbacks from the exchange they had.

This work in small groups allowed the Portuguese, Slovenian, Swedish and Belgian students to get to know each other a bit better.




Thursday 6th of May - Presentation of Urban IAS and cultural heritage.

The last morning was dedicated to two conferences presented by experts from the Walloon Public Service (SPW):


The first one was given by Etienne Branquart:
